What is an INVASIVE PLANT

doing in my back yard?

Weeds are plants that are unwanted in our garden or yard. Some may be perfectly good plants, but growing in the wrong place. Even a maple tree sprouting in your flower bed could be considered a weed. However, invasive plants are much worse.

move beyond property lines, spreading quickly and dominating the landscape at the expense of local ecosystems. Although some invasive plants may look pretty when in bloom, they damage valuable habitat by outcompeting native plants for water, soil nutrients, and sunlight.

HOW CAN I HELP?

- 1. While hiking or gardening, learn to identify invasive plants by color, leaf shape, and flower. A clue: masses of invasive plants are common in disturbed soils along hiking paths.
- 2. Take action! Invasive plants can be pulled, cut, burned, or sprayed. To find out the best ways to manage invasives that you encounter, visit ilhipp.org/resources
- 3. Clean your shoes and remove those sticky seeds from clothes after a hike.
- 4. Volunteer at your local park preserve or other natural area to help remove invasive species. For volunteer opportunities with HIPP, visit: ilhipp.org/do-your-part
- 5. Choose native plants! They can be easier to care for, and they provide more benefits for local wildlife.
